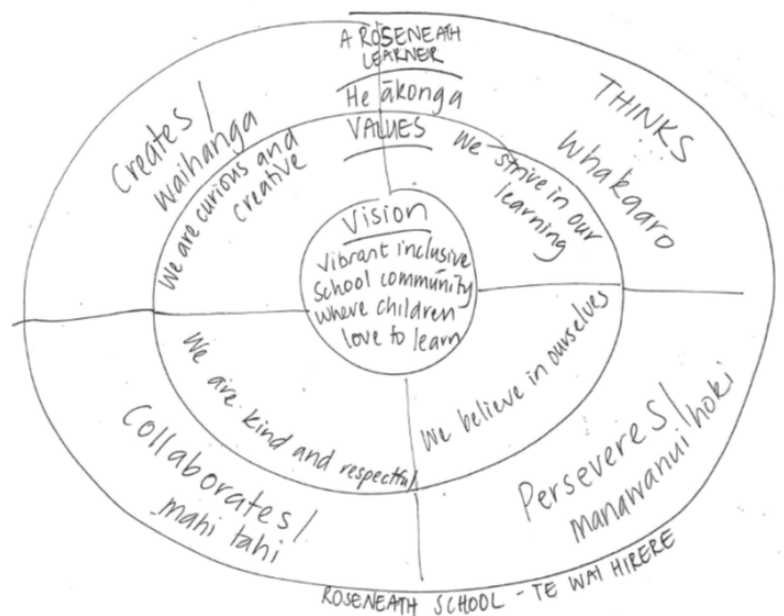
We have a final draft of the words (shown in Miss Carroll's best handwriting). We are now working with some a kind parent to finalise the visual design of the Charter.

3. Empower ākonga, whanau, teachers and the wider community to participate in collaborative partnerships for learning.

Student achievement

End of year student achievement data shows that we have maintained our excellent academic performance: 88% percent of our students are 'at or above' the national standards for reading; 82% are 'at or above' the national standards for reading; and 90% are 'at or above' the national standards for maths.

The extra effort in our target students has been successful in accelerating their progress. Credit to our students and teachers for the work that they have put in.

Following its review, the Education Review Office observed:

“Children achieve well at Roseneath School. National Standards information indicates overall improvement over the last three years. Māori children achieve as well as or, in some areas, better than non-Māori.”

And:

“The school demonstrates strong progress toward achieving equity in educational outcomes, supported by effective sustainable processes and practices”

Management changes 2018

The Board extends a warm welcome our new Deputy Principal Jenny Foote. Jenny will teach Year 6 in the Long Boat. She joins us from Kai Iwi School (Whanganui) where she has been Deputy Principal for nine years.

Finance

Understanding the School's finances has been big focus for the Board this year. We all attended NZSTA workshops on effective financial governance and have made some changes to how we allocate, monitor and review our finances to ensure that every dollar goes toward making a difference to our students and their learning.

Education Services Limited (ESL) now administers our accounts and, together with the Principal, is responsible for ensuring accurate and timely reporting to the Board of our financial position and cashflows. There has been no change to our banking details; and your payments and receipts are still managed by Joanne in the Office.

We are pleased to report that we end the year in a healthy financial situation, and will start 2018 on a strong footing.

Property works

Property has also received a lot of attention this year with the building work at the start of the year and the makeover of the Hall. Toward the end of the Hall project our builders found some rot in and around the window frames on the western wall of the hall. This is being repaired over the Christmas holidays by the D.S O'Leary team.

The Supernova in the Old Adventure Playground has proven to be a big hit with the kids, and with the new fence, the area is looking great.

The Board is working with Aspen Landscapes to complete this area early in the New Year; and to finalise plans for the area around the North Eastern bank.
